Overview of the Module

Lesson 1: Basic Principles of Teaching and Learning

A lecture will be delivered remotely on September 7, 2020 for this topic. The lecture will be recorded for your reference.

In addition, please read the reference material (1 Principles of Teaching). It covers the factors that influence the teaching and learning interaction, factors that facilitate effective teaching and learning principles.

You are expected to reflect upon and write a short essay on your favorite teacher as part of this lesson.

THINK ABOUT IT: In the many years that you have been a student, what factors have facilitated learning for you? What factors made learning difficult or more challenging?

Lesson 2: Introduction to Instructional Design and Writing of Learning Objectives

The ADDIE mode has been the model used for the redesign of courses in UPCM while Kemp and Dick & Carey models have been classically used on instruction.
