Writing the Introduction

The first chapter of your research proposal is the Introduction. Here you will provide the background of your study, state the research problem and objectives, and discuss the study's significance. A compelling and well-written introduction is important in research as it is where you provide an overview of your study, define relevant concepts, and articulate the purpose of your research, among others.
