Surg 251 (Integrated Clinical Clerkship II in Surgery) AY 2024-2025

COURSE GUIDE

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Surgery 251 is a 4-week course which will involve your direct participation in the inpatient care of surgical patients. You will be rotating for one week each in the three general surgery services(GS1, GS2, GS3) and the Trauma service. During your rotation, you will be assigned ward, operating room, and emergency room posts which will allow you to be directly involved in the actual care of patients. Enjoy your rotation and stay safe!

COURSE LEARNING OUTCOMES

This course aims to provide an avenue for students to apply their knowledge of the pathophysiology of common surgical disorders, principles of diagnosis and management, and in the actual care of patients under supervision of consultants or residents. After completing this course, you should be able to:

- 1) Apply basic surgical principles in the pre-operative and post-operative care of actual patients.
- 2) Integrate the pathophysiology of the patient's disease to the history and physical examination findings to arrive at a clinical diagnosis, and differentials of common surgical disorders and surgical emergencies.
- 3) Propose a diagnostic and therapeutic plan for common surgical disorders and surgical emergencies.
- 4) Effectively communicate to a patient and his relatives the clinical situation and the need for diagnostic and therapeutic measures.
- 5) Organize relevant medical information in an electronic data record.
- 6) Assist in the performance of operations both medium and major.
- 7) Perform procedures with the supervision of a consultant or a resident.
- 8) Develop the values of professionalism, teamwork, and patient safety in managing patients as part of a medical team.
- 9) Demonstrate knowledge of Universal Health Care/ Primary Health Care approach in the management of common surgical cases which can be managed in the community.

Written Examinations

An end of rotation quiz will be given at the end of your 4-week rotation (usually Sunday 9 am) based on must know topics in surgery (See Study Schedule). Please coordinate with your Resident Monitor for the schedule. The final exam and comprehensive examination will be given at the end of the year and will also be based also on the must know topics in surgery.

Clinical Performance

One small group discussion will be scheduled each week of your rotation, a group paper will also be submitted before the scheduled SGD to your Consultant-in-charge.

You are expected to join the activities of the GS Team you belong in. At the end of your rotation, an evaluation sheet from the Team Captain/Senior Resident of the team should be accomplished. You should also have an evaluation by the Surgeon on duty that you are in duty with.

All procedures and operating room assists should also be inputted in your Portfolio. SIC patient notes following an SOAP format should also be submitted (take a screen shot). Team rounds joined should also be recorded in your portfolio.

All these should be submitted (GS Team Evaluation Sheet, SIC patient notes, Portfolio) at the end of the rotation in the Google Submission Drive provided.

Return Demo Videos

Return demo videos of surgical hand scrubbing, gowning and gloving as well as suturing will be submitted at the end of the rotation in the Google Submission Drive provided.

Public Health Lecture

Every sub-block will be required to present a PHL for patients and watchers in the surgical wards based on a pre-assigned topic. The evaluation sheet for each group will be submitted at the end of the rotation in the Google Submission Drive provided.

Attendance and CEBS/SET

Guidelines for Return Demo Video Submission (Surg 251)

Scrubbing, Gowning and Gloving

Objective: To be able to demonstrate proper hand scrubbing, gowning and gloving using sterile technique.

Instructions: Submit a 3-5 minute video of surgical scrubbing(hand scrubbing), gowning and gloving, closed technique (See VLE video for sample). Gowns and surgical gloves may be provided thru your resident monitor.

Suturing and Suture Removal

Objective: To be able to demonstrate simple interrupted suturing and suture removal using surgical instruments.

Instructions: Submit a 3-5 minute video of you demonstrating at least 2 simple interrupted sutures and suture removal (See VLE video for sample). Surgical instruments and sutures may be provided thru your resident monitor.

Evaluation:

Return Demo Videos comprise 5% of your final grade.

Submit consolidated videos(per block) by Google Drive at the end of the rotation.
